Are you ready to gather in the harvest? If your answer is yes, read on. The 2021 ASC Fall Conference theme is "Gathering the Wheat" taken from Rev. 14:15. "Take your sickle and reap: harvest time has come and the harvest of the earth is ripe." When I reflected on this theme, two questions immediately came to mind.

What is really meant by Gathering the Wheat? and

Jesus gives us an answer to question #1 in John 4:35 where he says: "Do you not have a saying: Four months and then the harvest? The Art of Forming Young Disciples

When parish leaders are asked to identify a group under-served by parishes today, we often hear in response, "It has to be the youth." In this time of uncertainty, it is important that laity step out in



faith and take more responsibility in forming youth, not only within our church settings, but in our own homes as well. We are all called, no matter what age or role in life, to be Disciples of Christ through the sharing of our gifts and knowledge. Certainly, parental assistance and guidance is necessary in motivating children, but it is the combined efforts of clergy, parents, and the youth themselves that will harvest the most fruitful formation.

Technology, has a significant power to shift Christian values and moral thinking to that of worldly influence. We find ourselves in a battle where Christian culture is fighting against societal culture. This worldly culture attempts to condition our minds, through false words and actions, to follow self-fulfilling logic. The truth of God's commandments, and His word, are being rejected. This group of young people are searching for answers to questions about themselves and their Catholic faith. Parish members need to combine their efforts to hear them and find a new approach in preparing youth for the future.

As I see it, there are 6 Fundamentals in Forming Young Disciples (to have and to be):

- 1. Understanding
 - standing 2. Belonging
- 3. Transparency
- 4. Guidance 5. Critical Thinking 6. Self- Actualization

As facilitators, we must first address the need for more personal interaction with youth by having one-on-one conversations with them and providing a safe setting where all voices can be expressed and heard without judgment. Meeting outside the church premises in small groups of five or less may empower a more cohesive group, and a more productive outcome.



Regarding the teaching component, it is essential to reinforce the complete picture of Christ in the Church (tradition and basic truths of the Catholic Catechism) while still allowing for objectivity and discussion. Emphasizing the development of a personal relationship with Jesus is of utmost importance. Encouraging youth to read scripture, receive the sacraments, and live the Beatitudes and Ten Commandments can make a significant change in their life. Our greatest influence on them is our own faith walk and actions.

In conclusion:

With collective Spirit-lead mentorship, training, support and encouragement, we can then, confidently, pass on the leadership mantle to the youth of our church.

Empowered: To Be Strong (or weak?) David Webster

Over the past couple years, the ASC has been sponsoring an event for men called; Empowered: Catholic Conference for Men. This event is in its third annual conference with success in gathering men from around the Maritime Provinces with the intention to empower them in their faith, family and community. (See upcoming events) The theme chosen for the 2021 conference, "Strength", is taken from Judges 6:14. This story of Gideon inspires me to ponder what sort of man I should strive to be...a strong man, or a weak man? Since I am of this gender, I believe I can be bold enough to say that men spend a lot of time working on and/ or thinking about their discipline, confidence, courage and strength in order to be the man of God we desire to be for our families and communities. These attributes are certainly required to feel as though we are doing, and fulfilling, our part in our community work and in our effort to protect those we love and have responsibility for. Strength brings boldness and fearlessness.

But something strikes my heart when I look at this story of Gideon. Here is a man who questions what part God really plays in the life of the Israelites. Left in exile, they were afraid of, and felt powerless against their enemy, the Midianites, because their God who brought them out of Egypt and gave them a land of "milk and honey" seemed to have left them in their misery of captivity. But then, an Angel appears to Gideon proclaiming that God is with him. Gideon completely ignores the fact that the Angel calls him a "Valiant Warrior." He practically laughs it off by retorting rudely, "Excuse me?"

Gideon expressed little faith that God cared about their situation by questioning the Angel, "If God is with us, why is all this (Exile and oppression) happening to us? And where are all the miracles which our ancestors used to tell us about?" In all this doubt, Gideon didn't see himself as a believer in God's intervention, much less as a Valiant Warrior. But listen to what God speaks to him through the Angel. "Go in this strength of yours and you will rescue Israel from the power of Midian!"

Hold it! Wait! Can you repeat that? Gideon is expressing his frustration and doubt in God, but God calls this strength and gives him a rescue mission to free a nation? Gideon sees his family as part of the weakest clan of Israel, and himself being the least among his family. Gideon saw very little within himself that warranted a mission such as this, let alone to be considered a Valiant Warrior. He didn't even know if he could believe that God would want to do anything about it. He was just a lowly lay-person struggling to survive in the midst of their enemy. But somewhere in all of this, God saw great strength! Why?

I think God saw great strength in the character of Gideon for the simple reason that Gideon knew he was weak. Gideon knew that he could not fulfill the mission without the hand of God breaking down obstacles and barriers before him. God saw this humility (weakness) in Gideon and knew Gideon could not, and would not, take any credit for the completion of the mission. God knew Gideon would be like clay in his hand. This was the very reason God chose him. Gideon's weakness became his strength.

Then, what about me? Should I be striving for more discipline, confidence, boldness and strength? I believe I should! But not for personal gain. I need to become more disciplined in my reliance on the Lord. I need to be more confident that God is with me...always. I need to exercise more boldness in defending truth and uprightness. I need to rely on the strength of the Lord, more so than my own. I need to become more aware of the moments that the Spirit of God is urging me into unknown areas of the work of Christ Jesus. Then, as John the Baptist says in John 3:30, "He must become greater and I must become less."
